5/22 11:00 a.m. Sermon, "Remembering Tillich"
Speaker: The Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray
Paul Tillich was one of the most important theologians of the 20th century, and often seen as a patron saint by Unitarian-Universalists because of his work on the relationship of theology and culture and an expansive theology of world religions.
