# TODAY, 6/10 11:00AM – Reconciling Poverty, Economic Development, and Gentrification in Detroit

Kevin Ketels, Guest Speaker

How can we balance the competing interests of a city in which many residents have little practical access to opportunity within the context of substantial, yet uneven economic investment? Detroit is a city whose history is rich with contrast in both invention and oppression. While the national narrative speaks kindly to our recent efforts, the benefits are as elusive as ever for those outside downtown and midtown. The obstacles are significant, but the goal is achievable with community planning and public/private investments that build bridges for the marginalized to free themselves from poverty.

## 6/17 11:00AM -- How the Underground Railroad Changed America

Evelyn Millstein, Guest Speaker

In honor of Juneteenth, Evelyn Millstein will speak on The Underground Railroad as one of the most remarkable movements in American history. It was the first and only bi-racial movement led by African Americans. It was also the greatest mass civil disobedience movement America ever experienced. It began with the passage of the U.S. Constitution in 1778 and continued non-stop for over 70 years until 1861, when the Civil War began; the Underground Railroad in the South became a military branch of the Union army and thus helped end slavery.
