Greetings to the First UU metroit community!

In the spirit of Rev. Murray's March 20<sup>th</sup> sermon, "Women and Ordination," I'm happy to now confirm that all four of the women ministers ordained in our sanctuary will attend our centennial celebrations: **Rev. Nancy Doughty**, our former Minister of Education, ordained at First UU in 1962; Rev. Susann Pangerl (1979); **Rev. 

Julia Leedle (a/k/a Julia Spillman), a long-time First UU member, passed away on February 15, 2016.

Julia was an ardent peace activist and one who worked hard at promoting respect and friendship among the various races and ethnicities in Detroit. She was an active member of The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom and the NAACP, among other groups. At church, she was a leading member of the Red Door Players, acting and directing in several major productions.

Julia's sister, Barbara Dane, has shared a memory of Julia's 70<sup>th</sup> birthday party at the church. Julia was celebrated with a concert, directed and organized by Bill Meyer, one of Detroit's best known musical stalwarts. It was an amazing event, attended by former City Council president Erma Henderson, singers Martha Reeves and Josh White, Jr., and several other officials and artists including fellow actor Pete de Georgio, who read a beautiful tribute to Julia.

Julia attended First UU in the 1960s or 1970s until 1999, when she moved to California to be near her daughters. We offer our condolences to her family.
