REMEMBER THE TRUST

The First Unitarian-Universalist Church Trust was established in 1964 by the merger of the First Unitarian Church Trust with the Annis Fund and the Woodward Fund. Initially, only the interest earned on the principal in the Trust was given to the Church. However, as membership declined while salaries and building maintenance continued to increase, the Church called on the Trust repeatedly to invade the principal to keep the doors open. As of July, 2008, \$223,816 of Trust principal had gone to the Church. Had it not been for the Trust, the Church would not have been able to celebrate the centennial of the sanctuary on April 16-17, 2016. STANDING WITH ORLANDO — LOCALLY

FROM SHARON MILLS, UU DETROIT'S FAITH ALLIANCE REPRESENTATIVE TO AFFIRMATIONS: On June 14, over 700 people gathered at Affirmations in an interfaith vigil to remember and to honor the LGBTQ victims of the Orlando massacre. The room was silent as one by one the name of each victim was read aloud. We had gathered to stand in solidarity with the LGBTQ

community and to grieve with them for the victims of this unspeakable tragedy. The mood was emotional and defiant, with calls to action that resonated with the principles of our faith. The speakers, which included religious leaders, community activists, and elected officials from the entire metropolitan area, urged everyone present to continue to support the work of faith communities whose principles are rooted in inclusiveness. In addition, they asked that we all stand in solidarity against politicians who propose banning all Muslims, branding them as terrorists, while protecting the so-called right to carry militarily-designed guns in our communities. And most of all, "Stand up, Stand up in courage and in love." May it be so.

Rev. Murray changed his June 26th sermon topic in order to address the tragic events in Orlando.

Check the bulletin board in the Church Narthex to see our support for Orlando and to "Say Their Names." Vigils were organized by Rev. Kimi Riegel at Northwest UU Church and Rev. Leonetta Bugleisi of UU Church of Farmington. UU Detroiter's attended the vigils at our neighboring churches.

Annette Marquis, the Director of the UUA's LGBTQ and Multicultural Programs, Multicultural Growth and Witness, issued "<u>An Open Letter to Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer-identified Unitarian Universalists</u>."

UUA president Peter Morales issued a statement, excerpted in this graphic which was widely distributed among UU congregations:

"Unfortunately, this is the kind of violence that is predictable when hatred and fear are aroused by demagogues and when firearms are easily available. There are about 100 gun deaths per day in the United States. Only mass shootings are newsworthy.

This is madness.

May all people of good will, people of all faiths and no faith, renew our determination to end racism, end demonization of those of other faiths, end homophobia, and create a society where access to lethal weapons has some rational control. Otherwise we will wait helplessly for the next atrocity."
