March 6th – "Feminist Theology"

Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray As we enter into Women's History Month, I want to offer a brief review of feminist theology and its responses to the first wave, second wave, and third wave of feminist thought.

March 13th - "Defining Spirituality"

Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray One of my charges for this year is to offer programs on "spirituality." This is an almost infinitely broad term, intentionally capacious in its scope. Today, I will speak to various approaches to spirituality and how we, as a congregation, might explore spirituality together through engaging programs in the months ahead.

March 20th- "Women and Ordination"

Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray Unitarians and Universalists were among the first denominations to welcome women to join the ranks of ordained clergy, and indeed women always have been at the forefronts of these two, not twinned, religious movements. In conjunction with research done by Danny Rebb at our church's archives at the University of Michigan, I will discuss some of the influential UUA women who have moved through our church in Detroit.

Greetings to the First UU Detroit community!

First, let me thank each and every one of you for your patience this winter as we have "chilled" in the sanctuary. The boiler that provides the heat to the sanctuary has a broken gasket. EMEAC is aware of the broken gasket and has come up with a work-around because the gasket will cost \$4,000 to repair. We're working with EMEAC to see how everyone may be comfortable. Meanwhile, dress warm for Sunday morning!

Let us focus on less temporal matters ... after Rev. Murray's sermon on March 13, "Defining Spirituality," **Rev. Murray invites people interested in spirituality programs for the rest of the year to engage in a conversation during potluck after the worship service.** Please get your food and join him on the sofas in the parlor for a discussion about spirituality at First UU, with Rev. Murray moderating the conversation.

The spirituality discussion comports with Goal 4 of our 2016 Strategic Plan, "develop, conduct and evaluate opportunities and programs for spiritual growth." Thanks for taking the lead, Rev. Murray. We're also moving along fast and furiously with Goal 2, our Centennial celebrations.

Our *minister emeritus* (how many of our new congregants know we have a minister emeritus?) **Rev. Larry Hutchison**, and his wife, **Nancy**, are confirmed attendees. Also confirmed is our former Director of Religious Education, [now **Rev.] Emmy Lou Belcher**, who was ordained in our sanctuary in 1989, as well as two of the other three women who were ordained in our sanctuary: **Rev. Nancy Doughty** (1962) and **Rev. Lynda Smith** (2006). Rev. Smith is also a former First UU RE Director. We're hoping Rev. Susann Pangerl, who was ordained here in 1979, is able to come as well.

Check out details about Centennial festivities on **page 8**: an April 16 history tour, which will be offered – concurrently – both as a bus tour and a bicycle tour, followed by dinner at Traffic Jam & Snug restaurant; and a special worship service on April 17, after which we'll gather together at a potluck to wind up celebrations.

We're also planning an in-house service project: a Spring Clean-Up Day to get the church and grounds spruced up for our visitors. **Dan Wiest** and **Tim Bailey** are organizing this for Saturday, **April 9**. Watch for details in upcoming newsletters and orders of service.

Also watch for details about the upcoming 2016-17 Canvass Campaign. How else will we fund festivities like our Centennial, and future celebrations? Not to mention our wonderful minister, **Rev. Murray**.

As you may have noticed, your Board and Planning Committee have been on an organizational kick, so I want to let you know that we've been doing an incredibly thorough job at putting information on our church calendar. I'm usually focused on our 1st and 7th principles but I've been thinking about our 3rd principle a lot lately: acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations.

As an almost 35-year member of First UU Detroit, I can confidently make the observation that more than ever before we are all working together well and helping each other to move the church forward. Rev. Murray will find out your thoughts on spirituality on March 13 but I would say that our encouragement of one another and devotion to our faith is part of our spiritual practice. Governance runs smoothly, events (big and small) get planned, worship services are [often] unconventional and [always] inspiring, and we are growing, adding new members almost every month. I believe these new members have been motivated to join by all of you – I know you motivate me.

- Prayer and Spiritual Practices




Exciting denominational events are coming up!
