News from Our Members

In 2014, one of my favorite campaign memories was at the IAGD (Islamic Assoc of Greater Detroit) mosque in Auburn Hills. They invited candidates again this year. Both times, I told what our Faiz taught me/us about Islam.

This time, I was told that they have a dinner the first Sat. of every month, to which the public is invited. So I went on December 3, primarily to ask if their community has had problems since the election. I was introduced as a guest to a couple of women, spoken with and guided, led to the front of the dinner line.

One woman, with whom I had a lengthy conversation, when I told her the congregation I was part of, said she remembered that after 9/11, UU Detroit members formed a circle around the mosque across the street to protect it and its worshipers. I felt sooo proud!

Apparently, they've not been targeted, but those I met were so impressed that, after the business meeting and announcement of election of officers, the man presiding introduced me to the hundreds who were there. I stood for a moment to acknowledge that. And then he kept talking about me and thanking me for caring. (As did others right after the meeting.)

He explained their custom of giving family titles to others in the community, such as Sister--for example, as the Sisters from 4 countries, who cooked the dinner this time. And then he said I am now "Auntie Sherry." Such an honor simply for practicing UUism (and Green Party values, which includes Social Justice and Nonviolence). — Sherry A Wells

Policies and Procedures ...

So, You've Been Wondering About UU Detroit's Policies and Procedures?

Featured policy and procedure of the month: Child Protection

In June 2016, your Board of Trustees approved a Policies and Procedures Manual. The need for a manual became apparent from several different sources as diverse as the Planning Committee to our staff, from individual congregants to the Board itself. The P&P may be found on the first page of our website, 1stuu.org. Click on any title in the Table of Contents in the manual to go directly to that policy.

We're going to feature a summary of a P&P every month in the newsletter so you may get to know how UU Detroit operates!

POLICY STATEMENT: In order to provide a safe environment for the physical and emotional well-being of all children participating in UU Detroit activities, all child care volunteers will be screened and will be trained to follow procedures which will ensure that all children are safe and well protected at all UU Detroit-related activities.

Recognizing a need to provide child care on Sundays, a dedicated group of UU Detroiters worked to clean out the old "bride's room" off the narthex of the sanctuary. The room was scrubbed and painted, set up with a rocker, child-size table and chairs, and toys, games, paper, crayons and books, and repurposed as a nursery and child care room.

Just as — or perhaps even more — importantly, a child care policy was instituted.

The procedures to support the Child Protection Policy start with a screening of all volunteers, including an application process. The application process includes a background check, the providing of three references, and thorough reference checking. The three references must include: a person who has known the applicant for an extended period, a former or current supervisor; and a member of the applicant's immediate family.

The policy states that at no time is a child to be alone with an adult; there must always be two trained child care volunteers with the child. While the policy is written to so that children will be protected at all times, there is also an extensive section on how to report any (unlikely) case of abuse. Disruptive behavior and volunteer training are also covered in the policy.

Child care volunteers are on call each Sunday. A list of vetted, trained, qualified child care volunteers is available to our Sunday greeters so they may alert child care volunteers when a family arrives.
