

Featured policy and procedure of the month: Executive Sessions of the Board of Trustees

In June 2016, your Board of Trustees approved a Policies and Procedures Manual. The need for a manual became apparent from several different sources as diverse as the Planning Committee to our staff, from individual congregants to the Board itself. The P&P may be found on the first page of our website, 1stuu.org. Click on any title in the Table of Contents in the manual to go directly to that policy.

We're going to feature a summary of a P&P every month in the newsletter so you may get to know how UU Detroit operates!

— Planning Committee

"POLICY STATEMENT: It shall be at the discretion of the Board President or a motion by the Board to hold a private confidential executive session whenever appropriate to maintain a confidential discussion."

"RATIONALE OR BACKGROUND: It is sometimes important for the Board to have a confidential conversation which allows members to speak more openly and frankly about sensitive issues."

Moving a meeting to Executive Session is a common business practice and your board has utilized it to discuss, for instance, employee matters.


The procedures follow Robert's Rules of Order. Our bylaws state in Article IV, §2, ¶G, that all meetings are to be governed by Robert's Rules of Order so

this policy is a bit redundant, but since our meetings are open to all members, the Board wanted to be clear that sensitive matters will be handled in a confidential manner.

To maintain the transparency of board meetings, the minutes of any meeting in which the board goes into Executive Session will reflect details of the motion and vote to enter into Executive Session and will record any official report arising out of that Executive Session. Decisions made as a result of any Executive Session will be formally reported in the minutes.

Your board strives to represent the congregation as effectively and conscientiously as is possible. Hence it begins each board meeting by reciting aloud: "We covenant to work together in honesty, kindness and respect for each other as we carry out our elected responsibilities to do the business of this church to the best of our abilities. We are a religious community. Let us move forward in love."
