November 4th — "Love Ye One Another ... Except in the Voting Booth"

Dr. Terri Laws, Guest Speaker

We have moral obligations to one another as we consider how we vote. We are told that we should vote in our own self-interest. In light of every major religion's obligation to treat others as we would want to be treated. On this Sunday before election day, Dr. Laws will challenge our thinking on how we exercise such a principle as citizens in a democracy.

November 11th — "A Brief History of Unitarian Universalism"

Transgender Day of Remembrance

As we approach <u>Transgender Day of</u> <u>Remembrance</u> on November 20th, let us keep in mind the <u>words</u> of UUA President, The Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, in response to Donald Trump's July 2017 plan to ban transgender people from serving in the U.S. military:

"We believe that transgender people should be accorded all the rights and responsibilities due every citizen ... We call upon the Trump administration to uphold the American values of equality and service ..."

It's especially important that we stay vigilant and supportive of our transgender friends, in light of the recent news that the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has undertaken an effort to establish a legal (and narrow) definition of gender as being only male or female, and unchangeable, under Title IX, the federal civil rights law that bans discrimination on the basis of sex.

The UUA has established a Hurricane Michael Recovery Fund to assist congregations in repairing any damage, and to respond to the needs of their members' and their community's efforts to get back on its feet.

UUA staff is working closely with leaders in the Association's Southern Region, to ascertain where the need is greatest and distribute funds efficiently.

Love Resists

The UUA "Love Resists" campaign suggests <u>five</u> ways to respond with love to the newest attack on immigrants.

If you can do only one thing: Share your personal and professional perspective as comments on the public record against the indefinite detention of the children of asylum-seekers and against the "public charge" proposal which would discriminate against legal immigrants based on income and class. Each comment needs to be individual (not a "form letter") so speak from the heart.

MidAmerica Chalice Lighter Call

The *Chalice Lighter* program awards grants to congregations throughout the MidAmerica region.

For the Fall 2019 *Chalice Lighter* call, MidAmerica will be awarding one large grant to a single

congregation in the region with the hope that by giving bigger grants, congregations will dare to take on bigger projects, projects that could use a boost from Chalice Lighters in the \$10,000 to \$15,000 range. To make sure that there will still be plenty of opportunities for congregations to get grants under \$10,000, the Chalice Lighter program is going to start supporting *Faithify* campaigns beginning in September 2019.
