October 7th — "Loving the Least of These"

Carolyn Walker, Guest Speaker

A partnership of writing and mothering proved to be a godsend for Carolyn Walker, who began her career as a columnist shortly before her daughter Jennifer was born in 1977. Jennifer came into the world with a rare developmental disability that mystified even doctors, called Rubinstein-Taybi Syndrome. From the moment of her daughter's birth Walker found herself floundering in a new world, a secret, silent world, trying to understand what had happened. She soon learned through the power of writing about Jennifer that she could give a voice to the disabled and those who care for them. This was not a gift to be wasted. Walker's column eventually grew into the book Every Least Sparrow, a mother and daughter love story.

Walker's memoir will be available for sale during coffee hour. She will be happy to sign books.

October 14th — "King's Chapel"

The Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray, Minister
King's Chapel, the 4th oldest church in Boston, is somehow both
the original Anglican church in Boston AND the first Unitarian
church in the United States. To this day, they use a unique prayer
book that is based in the liturgy of the Church of England, but
steeped in Unitarian theology. This historical sermon will look at an
odd and wonderful church in the history of American
Unitarianism, still a vibrant place to visit and worship at today!

October 21st — "Thoreau"

The Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray, Minister

Today, we will do a deep dive into Henry David Thoreau, whose writings on natural history and philosophy deeply shaped the humanist and Unitarian Universalist movements. We will discuss his views on civil disobedience, the Walden years, and transcendentalism. O yes, and I'll reveal the secret story behind my one and only visit to Walden Pond!

October 28th — "Our Universalist Roots and Branches"

Rev. Kalen Fristad, Guest Speaker

Rev. Fristad will be speaking on universalism as it relates to John Murray and Thomas Potter, the American colonies, and from then to the present. In this sermon, he will expand upon his "Universalism: Past, Present and Powerful" sermon given at UU Detroit on 4/19/18.



Monthly "Share the Plate" Sunday

When Hurricane Florence arrived in the Carolinas, thousands of coastal residents were under mandatory evacuation orders as the region braced for potentially catastrophic damage. Our Share the Plate recipient for September 16th was the UUA Disaster Relief Fund so the UUA can provide financial assistance to UU congregations impacted by this and other natural disasters.

Our September 16th "Share the Plate" recipient was the **UUA Disaster Relief Fund**. https://aiving.uua.org/disaster-aid.

In addition to facilitating their own disaster recovery, congregations—and other UU entities—receiving disaster relief funds have discretion to provide financial assistance to their members, as well as to support local partner organizations serving the community at large.

This summer the UUA provided grants to congregations in California and Colorado affected by devastating wildfires. A Colorado congregation reported back:

"We are a very small congregation and this fire directly affected 30% of us, so it is so reassuring to know that during a disaster we can count on our larger association to help us and make sure everyone is safe and sound. Local firefighters were


very grateful that we could help take care of them as well as they saved many of our homes.

"It also meant a lot to us that we could in turn help local organizations that serve communities that are typically overlooked...undocumented people have no access to federal, state, or county funds so they must rely on donations. We made a real difference in their lives."

Your donation now will allow the UUA to respond flexibly to this and new disaster situations as they arise.

The rules for the Share the Plate Sunday are as follows: Any funds received during the offertory that have no designation will be split 50/50 between our guest recipient and the church. Please mark in the memo area of your check or on the envelope as to how you want your donation to be allocated. Share the Plate donations do not count toward your pledge.

We believe in

- 1) the inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- 2) justice, equity and compassion in human relations;
- 3) acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our Congregations;
- 4) a free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- 5) the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our Congregations and in society at large;
- 6) the goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- 7) respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

We live out these Principles within a "living tradition" drawn from sources as diverse as science, poetry and literature, scripture, and personal experience.

The Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in Unitarian Universalist religious communities.

Detroit has been home to Universalists and Unitarians since the early 1830s. <u>UU Detroit's history</u> of fighting for civil liberties in the world and advocating for Detroit is long and strong. Radical thinkers who worshipped, spoke, met, and/or organized at the corner of Cass & Forest include ground-breaking African-Americans; civil rights radicals and martyrs; icons of the women's and workers' rights movements; LGBTQ forerunners; progressive politicians; environmental activists; immigration reformists; promoters of, and martyrs for, peace; and authors, educators, musicians, and poets.
