# July 7th — "Research & Spirituality"

Irene Brisson, Guest Speaker

How can the spiritual search for truth and meaning be figured as a sort of research project? In short, what are questions to ask ourselves and others in this pursuit? Reflecting on the practices of scientific inquiry, I consider the role of repetition in spiritual traditions. Intersecting the writings of physicist Michael Faraday, poet T.S. # Herz documentary update

Director Betsy Kalin writes, "As some of you know, I'm working on Phoenix: The Life and Death of Alice Herz — a documentary about Alice, a peace activist who was erased from US history for her act of self-immolation to protest the Vietnam War. She was mentioned in The Washington Post yesterday! [The article was published on May 30] After Arnav Gupta's self-immolation death this week, the article asserts that these are unmistakable acts of protest and we need to be listening: '82-year-old Alice Herz, after returning from a demonstration against racial violence in Selma, Ala., walked to a street corner in Detroit and set herself on fire. She had been protesting, marching and writing against the war in Vietnam and racial segregation in the American South. She had told her friends and family she was not being heard.' This is another example that the time is right for our story! Please help us to tell it."

Alice Herz, and her daughter, Helga, were longtime members of UU Detroit. Alice immolated herself in March 1965. The documentary explores her life and death while questioning why she has been erased from history as both an intellectual leader of the twentieth century and as a courageous woman effecting social change.

# Migrant children installation

On June 1st, UU Detroiters showed up to pound stakes and mount stuffed toys on the Commons' lawn at the corner of Cass and Prentis for an installation representing migrant children separated from their parents. The story was featured in the <u>Detroit News</u> and the <u>Metro Times</u>. The latter reported:

"A woodland of hundreds of toys, dolls, teddy bears, and other stuffed animals are spread throughout the front lawn of the First Unitarian Universalist Church in the Cass Corridor, with a large banner hanging across the background that reads, 'For the thousands of separated immigrant children.'"

"The installation [is] a poignant visual representation of the thousands of children who have been separated from their families under the Trump administration."

# Support LGBT ministries

The Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, UUA President, writes: "Historically, faith communities haven't always been the most welcoming of places for LGBTQ people. Nearly thirty years ago the UUA set out to change that with a new program to guide congregations in becoming truly open and accepting of LGBTQ members and visitors: Welcoming Congregations."

UU Detroit first successfully completed the requirements to become a Welcoming Congregation in 1997; in 2015 we successfully renewed our status as a Welcoming Congregation. In 2018, the UUA instituted updated requirements to remain a Welcoming Congregation, The Five Practices. From the UUA Welcoming Congregation page:

"We wish to be bolder with our Welcome. Transgender Unitarian Universalists are still struggling to find community in UU congregations. Bisexual UUs suffer from invisibility while asexual, intersex, and polyamorous communities are wrestling with a progressive faith that does not privilege their truth. These and the many more social ills that plague our LGBTQ+ and TGQNB communities are calling us into a deeper commitment to insure that our Unitarian Universalist congregations are living into the Welcome that we boldly proclaim. As such, we are unveiling the The Five Practices of Welcome Renewal."

The Five Practices summarized:

- 1. Become a Welcoming Congregation done
- 2. Welcoming Worship Services *done*

- 3. Welcoming Days of Observance *entered on church* calendar for future planning
- 4. Welcoming Congregation Module TBA
- 5. Support a Welcoming Project TBA

#### **Rev. James Reeb**

Alice Herz and Viola Liuzzo were mentioned earlier in this newsletter, both of whom died in March 1965. Another UU who died in March 1965 was Rev. James Reeb of Boston, MA. Like Viola Liuzzo, he was murdered in Selma, AL while answering the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's call to clergy to participate in the Montgomery, AL bus boycott. National Public Radio presents a seven-part serialized podcast on Rev. Reeb's murder, White Lies, hosted by investigative journalists Chip Brantley and Andrew Beck Grace, in which they explore why Rev. Reeb's murder has not been solved for 50 years. # Migrant justice

The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee's Petition to Close Down the Homestead Child Detention Center in Florida, signed by more than 100,000 individuals, was delivered to the U.S. Health and Human Services Department in Washington DC. Our history of fighting for civil liberties in the world and advocating for Detroit at home is long and strong. Our roots in Detroit go back over 185 years: Universalists first worshiped in Detroit in 1831, Unitarians in 1833. One hundred years later, an experimental union of the two congregations led to an official merger, preceding the national merger of the two denominations (in 1961) by 27 years.

Radical thinkers who worshipped, spoke, met, and organized within our congregations include ground-breaking African-Americans; civil rights crusaders; progressive politicians; icons of women's movements; promoters of workers' rights; LGBTQ pioneers; peace activists and martyrs; environmental champions; immigration reformists; trailblazing authors, poets, educators, scientists, architects, and musicians.

Seeking solace in community and a vision of how to put faith into action — from 19th century abolitionists to 20th century suffragettes to 21st century water warriors — we have lived out and continue to live out our Principles.

#### **OUR SEVEN PRINCIPLES:**

- 1st: The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- 2nd: Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;
- 3rd: Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- 4th: A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- 5th: The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- 6th: The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- 7th: Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
